ntil it flowed into the Pacific. The next year they
eturned to St. Louis by approximately the same

 route. Because of the great care with which plans
 had been made, the expedition was remarkably
 _successful. Lewis and Clark had lost only one
 man, who probably had been a victim of
 _appendicitis. They had found a land route to the
 _Pacific and had improved the nation's access to
 _the Oregon Territory, which was rich in resources.
