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As Philip is sitting in Dr. Palleni's office, he is told "rules are rules" (62). This statement puzzles Philip as he sees no connection between this rule and the consequences of his actions. Philip, like many students, has a hard time seeing the connection between behaviors and the consequences for his actions. When one looks at this situation one could see many different ways this could have been resolved.

Philip seems to recognize that there are rules that must be followed. He made the conscience decision to disobey the school's rules of being quiet during the playing of the national anthem. He believes he is justified in his actions because he believes he is being patriotic. Philip is also conflicted because he claims he was able to sing or hum in his last homeroom.
